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POWER & GLORY: COURT ARTS OF CHINA'S MING DYNASTY

June 27-September 21, 2008

SCHEDULE OF EXHIBITION-RELATED PROGRAMS

San Francisco, CA, May 13, 2008: For centuries, Ming porcelain vases have been regarded as the epitome of priceless beauty. The Asian Art Museum's special exhibition, *Power & Glory: Court Arts of China's Ming Dynasty* demonstrates why not just vases but Ming art of many types has earned such acclaim. On view from June 27–September 21, 2008, and timed to coincide with the summer Olympics in Beijing, this major groundbreaking exhibition explores the grandeur and opulence of one of the most important dynasties in Chinese history. *Power & Glory* also marks the Asian Art Museum's first collaboration with three of China's most prestigious institutions — The Palace Museum (Forbidden City) in Beijing, the Nanjing Municipal Museum, and the Shanghai Museum. Some of the most precious artworks from the Ming dynasty (1368–1644) from these museums, along with some of the finest items from this period owned by the Asian Art Museum, make up *Power & Glory*, the first exhibition in the U. S. to focus on the full range of Ming court arts. Many of the more than 240 objects — porcelain, paintings, textiles, lacquer, jade, jewelry, architectural elements, and more — are on view for the first time in the United States. The exhibition provides a rare opportunity to experience the breadth and depth of Ming achievement, through an unequalled collection of works from the Chinese dynasty most renowned for its refined aesthetic and standards of perfection. The exhibition will travel to the Indianapolis Museum of Art (October 26–January 18, 2009 tentative) and the St. Louis Museum of Art (February 21–May 17, 2009).

In conjunction with the special exhibition *Power and Glory: Court Arts of China's Ming Dynasty*, the museum invites visitors to encounter one of the oldest living traditional arts, the music of the Chinese *guqin*. Appearing in Chinese writings as old as 3,000 years, this zither-like instrument is the most revered

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of Chinese instruments. In residence at the Asian Art Museum will be the distinguished scholar and musician Wang Fei.

Famous for its meticulous needlework and vivid representation, Gu embroidery originated from the present-day Shanghai area during the Ming dynasty. Gu embroidery is also known as “painting embroidery” for the subjects are generally based on the elegant paintings of previous dynasties. Renowned embroidery artists from China, Shao Xiao-Cheng, Chen Hong-Ying and Qian Yue-Fang, lead interactive demonstrations of various techniques and silk thread arrangements. Adventures of the Treasure Fleet is the amazing story of the larger than life Ming Dynasty naval commander, Admiral Zheng He. During his life, Zheng He led more than 300 brightly painted ships (the Treasure Fleet) on seven epic voyages across the South China Sea, to the Indian Ocean, and all the way to the distant coast of Africa. An Admiral, during the reign of the Yongle emperor (1403-24), Zheng He was a trusted friend who became an important diplomatic envoy during the Yongle reign. Author Ann Bowler reads from this beautifully illustrated book. Guests can play with artifacts collected and traded on the voyages and then construct their own 3-dimensional boat inspired by the Treasure Fleet.

July 3: Sound of the Sages

The guqin (goo chin), a seven-stringed zither, is China's oldest stringed instrument, with a history of some 3000 years. The July MATCHA channels the ancient strings of China's philosophers, sages, and emperors. Enjoy the spiritual song of guqin, try your hand at brush painting, encounter the tranquility and strength of tai chi, stroll the galleries and special exhibitions on a docent tour, or simply enjoy a drink and hang out with friends. This program is co-presented with the North American Guqin Association.

August 7: Drunken Fist

Former champion US World Team Member, Philip Wong and former Beijing Wushu Team champion Zhang Hong Mei lead members of Bay Area martial arts school Pacific Wushu in a special demonstration at the Asian Art Museum. Jump on a special docent tour of weaponry in Asia, or try out a hands-on activity. Tune-in to a special talk on shaolin martial arts or "kick it" with the DJ, a drink, and some friends.

September 4: Tea & Spice

Recently back from its annual trek to Burning Man, John Oda’s Tea Temple will be erected inside the museum. The stupa-like structure pays homage to the nomadic structures of the Silk Road where tea was traded for thousands of years. Underneath the big top, participants can discover floral, fruity, and earthy teas of China. Elsewhere in the museum, experience teas from India, Tibet, or Iran. Hop on a docent tour through arts of the Ming dynasty, arts of the Silk Roads, and the spice routes.

Participants will learn the basic vocabulary of brushstrokes and techniques for painting traditional Chinese landscapes with artist Aiqin Zhou. Participants learn watercolor methods and processes and then create artworks using natural hair brush and mulberry paper. An architectural gem featuring a dynamic blend of beaux arts and modern design elements, the museum's new home is the result of a dramatic transformation of San Francisco's former main public library building by renowned architect Gae Aulenti (designer of Paris's Musée d'Orsay) into a showcase for the museum's celebrated collection and exhibitions.
